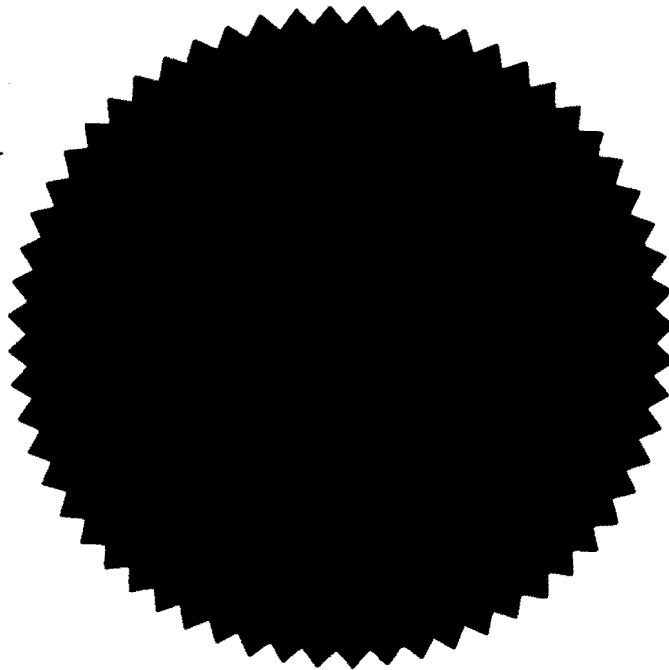



ARRANGEMENT OF SECTIONS

SECTION

1. Short title.
2. Insertion of section 44 in the Principal Act.
3. Repeal and re-enactment of section 36 of Chapter 2:01.

AN ACT to amend the Legal Practitioners Act and to provide for incidental matters.

A. D. 1974 Enacted by the Parliament of Guyana:—

title.
Cap. 4:01

1. This Act, which amends the Legal Practitioners Act, may be cited as the Legal Practitioners (Amendment) Act 1974.

Insertion

44 in the

2. The Principal Act is hereby amended by the insertion immediately after section 43 of the following section —

“Rights as to practice as State Solicitor or Deputy State Solicitor.”

44. (1) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Act or in any other law where any barrister is appointed to the office of State Solicitor, or to act therein, he shall be entitled to practise as a solicitor for the purpose of discharging the functions of that office and any such barrister shall, when acting in the capacity of State Solicitor, be deemed to be a solicitor for the purposes of any law.

(2) The provisions of subsection (1) shall, as they apply to the office of State Solicitor, apply *mutatis mutandis* to the office of Deputy State Solicitor.”

3. Section 36 of the Interpretation and General Clauses Act is hereby repealed and the following section substituted therefor —

“Functions of office of Deputy State Solicitor.”

36. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in any law the Deputy State Solicitor shall have and may exercise and perform all the functions in respect of the offices of the State Solicitor, Official Receiver and Public Trustee as are conferred or imposed by any law.”

Passed by the National Assembly on the 9th of October, 1974.
