CONSTITUTION (AMENDMENT) BILL 1995 - Bill No. 11/1995 published 20.5.95

A BILL intituled AN ACT to effect an alteration to article 142 of the Constitution in accordance with articles 66 and 164 thereof.

1. CONVENTIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL LABOUR ORGANISATION

The Senior Minister of Labour, Human Services and Social Security to move the following motion:

WHEREAS as a member state of the International Labour Organisation, Guyana is obligated to examine Conventions and Recommendations adopted by the International Labour Conference in accordance with Article 19 of the Constitution of the International Labour Organisation;

AND WHEREAS Article 19 states that all Conventions and Recommendations adopted by the International Labour Conference must be submitted to the Competent Authority of member states whether ratification of such Conventions is contemplated or not;

AND WHEREAS the submission of Conventions and Recommendations adopted at sessions of that Conference should always be accompanied or followed by a statement or proposal setting out the Government's view as to the action to be taken on the instruments;

AND WHEREAS Guyana adheres to the Constitution of the International Labour Organisation of which it is a member since 1966;

AND WHEREAS the Government of Guyana proposes to use the provisions of the Conventions and Recommendations adopted from time to time by the International Labour Conference as aims of policy and to ratify those Conventions which are in keeping with the social philosophy of the Guyanese Society;

BE IT RESOLVED:

That this National Assembly approve the conclusions set out in the State Paper on the following Conventions and Recommendations adopted at the 74th session of the International Labour Conference held in September, 1987:-

- (i) Seafarers Welfare Convention, 1987, No. 163.
- (ii) Seafarers Welfare Recommendation, 1987, No. 173.
- (iii) Health Protection and Medical Care (Seafarers)Convention, 1987, No. 164.
- (iv) Social Security (Seafarers) Convention, (Revised) 1987, No. 165.
- (v) Repatriation of Seafarers Convention (Revised) 1987, No. 166.
- (vi) Repatriation of Seafarers Recommendation, 1987, No. 174,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

That the decision of this National Assembly be conveyed to the Director General of the International Labour Organisation.

2. RATIFICATION OF THE PROTOCOLS OF AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF THE ORGANISATION OF AMERICAN STATES: THE PROTOCOL OF WASHINGTON AND THE PROTOCOL OF MANAGUA

The Senior Minister of Foreign Affairs to move the following motion:

WHEREAS the Sixteenth Special Session of the General Assembly of the Organisation of American States (OAS), meeting in Washington, DC, USA, on December 14, 1992, considered amendments to the OAS Charter which would provide for new arrangements relating to representative democracy and extreme poverty;

AND WHEREAS the Sixteenth Special Session adopted the Protocol of Amendments to the Charter of the OAS known as the Protocol of Washington; AND WHEREAS the Sixteenth Special Session also approved inclusion in the OAS Charter of new provisions and modifications to address the issue of the elimination of extreme poverty;

AND WHEREAS the Nineteenth Special Session of the OAS General Assembly, meeting in Managua, Nicaragua, on June 10, 1993, adopted another Protocol of Amendments to the Charter of the OAS known as the Protocol of Managua;

AND WHEREAS the Protocol of Managua addresses the problem of extreme poverty in that it specifically provides for greater effectiveness and efficiency in the area of OAS technical co-operation by merging the functions of the two existing OAS technical co-operation Councils, the Inter-American Economic and Social Council (CIES) and the Inter-American Council for Education, Science and Culture, into a new Inter-American Council for Integral Development (CIDI);

AND WHEREAS the Government of Guyana signed the Protocols of Washington and Managua on December 14, 1992 and on June 10, 1993, respectively:

BE IT RESOLVED:

That this National Assembly approve the ratification by the Government of Guyana of the Protocols of Amendments to the Charter of the Organisation of American States: the Protocol of Washington and the Protocol of Managua.

That this National Assembly approve the ratification by the Government of Guyana of the Convention on the Prevention, Punishment and Eradication of Violence against Women (the Convention of Belem do Para).
