That this National Assembly salute the United Nations on its Fiftieth Anniversary;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

That this National Assembly give its full support to the United Nations as it continues to discharge its mandate in the new circumstances of the post-Cold War World.

AND WHEREAS the Government of Guyana proposes to use the provisions of the Conventions and Recommendations adopted from time to time by the International Labour Conference as aims of policy and to ratify those Conventions which are in keeping with the social philosophy of the Guyanese society:

BE IT RESOLVED:

That this National Assembly approve the conclusions set out in the State Paper on the following Convention and Recommendation adopted at the 78th Session of the International Labour Conference held in June, 1991:-

- (i) Working Conditions (Hotels and Restaurants)
 Convention, 1991, No. 172
- (ii) Working Conditions (Hotels and Restaurants)
 Recommendation, 1991, No. 179,

That the decision of this National Assembly be conveyed to the Director General of the International Labour Organisation.
