## ORDER IN COUNCIL

## MADE UNDER

THE TRADE ORDINANCE, 1958,

(No. 34 of 1958).

UNDER SECTION 5 OF THE TRADE ORDINANCE, 1958, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL AS FOLLOWS:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Trade (Union of South Africa) (Prohibition) Order, 1960.
  - 2. It shall not be lawful for any person
    - (a) to import any goods into the Colony from the Union of South Africa; or
    - (b) to import into the Colony from any country any goods which have been produced, manufactured or processed in the Union of South Africa:

Provided that the foregoing provisions of this article shall not apply to the importation of any goods which are shown to the satisfaction of the Competent Authority to have been ordered before the commencement of this Order.

- 3. For the purposes of this Order any label, mark, description or other sign indicating that any article was produced, manufactured or processed in the Union of South Africa shall be *prima facie* evidence that such article was produced, manufactured or processed in the Union of South Africa.
  - 4. It shall not be lawful for any person
    - (a) to export any goods from this Colony to the Union of South Africa; or
    - (b) to export from this Colony to any country any goods with intent to tranship or cause such goods to be transhipped, whether by sea, land or air, into the Union of South Africa.
- 5. It shall be lawful for the Competent Authority or any person authorised by him in that behalf to enter and inspect any premises with a view to securing compliance with this Order.
- 6. For the purpose of securing compliance with this Order any person carrying on or employed in any trade or business shall produce to the Competent Authority or any person authorised in writing by the Competent Authority in that behalf such books, accounts or other documents relating to such trade or business as the Competent Authority may require from time to time.
