THE TRADE ACT

(Cap. 91:01)

IN EXERCISE OF THE POWERS CONFERRED UPON ME BY SECTION 5 OF THE TRADE ACT, I HEREBY MAKE THE FOLLOWING ORDER:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Trade (Control of Sale of Essential Goods) Order 1979. Citation.

2. In this Order — Inter-pretation.

“authorised seller”, in relation to any essential goods, means any person authorised in writing by the Competent Authority to sell such goods;

“delivery certificate” means a certificate issued under Clause 4;

“essential goods” means any goods listed in the first column of the First Schedule and being in excess of the quantity specified in relation thereto in the second column.

Authorised seller.

3. No person shall sell essential goods unless he is an authorised seller.

Duty to give delivery certificate.

4. Where an authorised seller sells essential goods, he shall, when delivering the goods or any part thereof to or for the purchaser, give to the recipient a certificate in respect of the goods or that part, as the case may be, and retain in his possession a duplicate thereof. Each certificate and the duplicate thereof shall be signed by the person delivering the goods and by the person receiving them.

Contents of delivery certificate.

5.(1) All delivery certificates issued by an authorised seller shall be numbered consecutively and shall be completed by him in the form set out in the Second Schedule.

(2) It shall be the duty of any person receiving essential goods from an authorised seller to furnish him with all information reasonably required to enable the delivery certificate relating to the goods to be properly completed.

Delivery certificate to accompany goods.

6. Except with the permission in writing of the Competent Authority, no person shall transport any essential goods unless he has in his possession a delivery certificate in respect thereof and the transportation is being effected not later than the date stated in paragraph 9 of the certificate.

Production of delivery certificate.

7. Every person transporting any essential goods shall, on being so required by any police constable or any person authorised in writing by the Competent Authority, produce a delivery certificate in respect thereof.

Transportation by most direct route.

8. Except for good cause, the proof whereof shall lie on him, every purchaser of essential goods shall transport them or cause them to be transported continuously and by the most direct route from the place where he or his agent received them from the authorised seller to the address stated in the delivery certificate as the address to which the goods are to be transported.
