CHAPTER 177.

CROWN LANDS (PRIVATE ROADS).

CUTTING OF WOOD.

REGULATIONS

made by the Governor and Court of Policy under section 11 on the Regs. 1st June, 1894.

1. These regulations may be cited for all purposes as the Private Roads (Wood Cutting) Regulations.

2. The holder of any permission issued under the Crown Lands (Private Roads) Ordinance to construct and maintain any road necessary for mining, wood cutting, or other purposes, shall be entitled to the free and unrestricted right to cut, take, and use, free of charge, from any Crown land not lawfully in the occupancy of any person, and which is within one quarter of one mile from the private road, any wood, timber, or other material required *bona fide* for the making and upkeep of that road.

3. Any person who, under the pretext of these regulations, takes wood, timber, or other material from the Crown lands for other than the purposes herein made lawful, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty-four dollars, for each offence, to be recoverable summarily before the magistrate of the district on the complaint of any officer of the Lands and Mines Department.
