

CHAPTER 244.

SALVATION ARMY.

[No. II of 1916.]

[6th May, 1916.]

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Salvation Army Ordinance. Short title.
2. William Bramwell Booth, appointed to be the General of the Salvation Army in succession to the late William Booth, shall be deemed to be the present General of that Army, and the expression "the General," hereafter used in this Ordinance, means the General of that Army for the time being. Present General of the Army.
3. The General shall be deemed a corporation sole, and shall be known and described as the General of the Salvation Army. General of Salvation Army a corporation sole.
4. All immovable property in the colony, and any interest in or concerning immovable property, which were on the twentieth day of August, nineteen hundred and twelve, vested in the said William Booth or William Bramwell Booth, are hereby vested in the General for the estate and interest and to the extent respectively vested in the said William Booth or William Bramwell Booth. Immovable property vested in the General.
5. All immovable and movable property in the colony and any interest therein now vested in the said William Bramwell Booth are hereby vested in the General to the same extent as that to which they vested in the said William Bramwell Booth prior to the passing of this Ordinance. All property vested in the General.
6. The General shall have full power to acquire by purchase, transfer, donation, exchange, devise, bequest, grant, gift, conveyance, or otherwise, any movable or immovable property in the colony or any estate or interest therein. Power of General to acquire property.

The General's powers of dealing with property of the Army.

7. The General shall, subject to any restraint, reservation, or condition contained in the document under which he has acquired title thereto, be entitled to sell, mortgage, lease, and otherwise dispose of and deal with, all property for the time being vested in or acquired by him under any of the provisions of this Ordinance, and he may sue for and recover all property and effects, both movable and immovable, and may take possession of any moneys belonging to the Salvation Army, or to William Bramwell Booth as the General thereof, or to any succeeding General.

No change of holder of office of General to affect tenure of property.

8. No change of the holder of the office of General shall affect any movable or immovable property or any interest therein vested in the General, but that property and the estate and interest therein shall vest in the succeeding General in the same way and to the same extent as they vested in the former General.

Power to appoint an attorney.

9. The General shall have power to appoint an attorney for the time and purposes and with the power stated in the power of attorney.

Record and effect of appointment and acceptance of office of General.

10. When copies, certified by the proper officer, or sealed by the proper department of his Majesty's High Court of Justice in England, of documents purporting to be the appointment and acceptance of office by a General are recorded in the deeds registry, the person named in that appointment and acceptance shall be deemed to be the General until similarly certified copies of a new appointment and acceptance are lodged and recorded.

Saving.

11. Nothing in this Ordinance shall prejudice or affect the rights of his Majesty the King, his heirs and successors, or of any body politic or corporate, or of any other person or persons except the persons mentioned in this Ordinance and those claiming by, from, through, or under them.
