TELEGRAPH REGULATIONS.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Coronation) Telegraph Regulations, 1937, and shall cease to take effect as from 17th May, 1937. Short title.

2. For the period 8th to 16th May, 1937, inclusive, Coronation Letter Telegrams shall be accepted for transmission over the Post Office Inland land-line and radio telegraph systems at one-fifth of the charge for an ordinary telegram over the same system, with a minimum charge for ten words. The conditions governing acceptance and transmission of such telegrams shall be as follows :—

- (1) The prefix "CLT" shall be used as the first chargeable word in the address.
- (2) Telegrams shall be restricted to those to or from places in British Guiana and the United Kingdom.
- (3) The rules governing letter telegrams (except for the minimum of 10 words) shall apply.
- (4) The charges mentioned above shall be in addition to the charges made by the West India and Panama Telegraph Company for transmission of the telegram outside the Colony.
