To every qualified Medical Practitioner who is not in the receipt of any salary or remuneration from the Public Revenues, for making a complete post mortem examination of the dead body of the deceased person, including the dissection of the body, either with or without an analysis of the contents of the stomach and intestines or preparing them for transmission to the Government Analyst, making the report required by the Ordinance, and certifying the cause of death

N.B.—No mileage of travelling expenses to be allowed, but in special cases it shall be lawful for the Governor to order the payment of such extra remuneration for travelling expenses, or otherwise, as he may deem just and reasonable.
