## ACCOUNTS

The accounts disclose that the operations of the Board during the period under review resulted in a trading profit of $\$ 695,196$. An amount of $\$ 137,620$. was expended on Grants \& Aids to the Industry, and there was thus a net eacess of Income over Expenditure of $\$ 557,576$. This amount was credited to the accumulated deficiency thereby reducing this deficiency to $\$ 2,597,480$.

## OPERATING COSTS

3. Net operating expenses for the year totalled $\$ 1,657,535$ as against $\$ 1,802,630$ in the previous year. The total number of bags of rice handled was $1,423,823$ as compared with 1,391,610. Operating costs thus worked out at $116.4 \$$ per bag as against $130.0 \$$ per bag in the previous year.

## RURCHASES_AND_SALES

5. The quantity of rice purchased by the Board during the period under review was $1,415,146$ bags, equivalent to 113,717 tons.
6. Sales of rice by the Board during the period amounted to $1,428,369$ bags $/ 114,779$ tons; of which 142,492 bags $/ 11,450$ tons were sold for local consumption and 1,285,877 bags /103,329 tons wore exported.
7. Contractual and non-contractual exports of rice for the year are set out in Tables 'A' and 'B' at Appendices ' F '.

## DOMESTIC CONSUMPTION

8. In addition to the quantity of 11,450 tons of rice sold by the Board for local consumption, 449,768 bags equivalent to 36,155 tons were retained by producers for their own consumption. The total domestic consumption of rice thus amounted to 47,605 tons.
9. It was estimated that a further quantity of 26,430 tons of paddy equivalent to 17,000 tons of rice was used for animal feed and seed planting.

## CROP RESULTS AND PROSPECTS

10. The 1966 Autumn and 1967 Spring crops yielded 147,600 tons of rice and 20,000 tons of rice respectively, totalling 167,600 tons, for the year.
11. The total availabilities for the year, including the carry over of 24,743 tons from the previous year, thus amounted to 197,144 tons of rice, which were disposed of as follows:

## EXPORT MARKETS

12. The West Indian Islands have remained the main export markets for Guyana's rice, with increases in the requirements of some of the territories. There has been a considerable rise in sales to Guadeloupe and Martinique over the last two years and, in spite of penetration of rice from other areas, Guyana's rice continues to hold these markets, in both packaged and bulk form.
13. During the period under review, the Board purchased another "Mira-Pak" Packaging Machine for packaging rice in polyethylene bags, and packaging can now be compared with that of the United Kingdom and the United States of America.
14. Packaging for the Jamaica market has been rising steadily, and there is every indication that this sophisticated territory will be importing more packaged rice than bulk in the near future.
15. During this period, the Connell Rice \& Sugar Company, incorporated, sold a further 40,000 tons of rice to new markets, several shipments of which went to Singapore and Hong Kong in addition to West Africa.
