The yield from the Tax on attendances at Race Meetings was 53,439 as against 53,483 in 1957 and 53,831 in 1956. Collections of the 42" Film Tax from exhibitors in accordance with the provisions of section 7 of the Tax Ordinance amounted to 54,129 as compared with 555,296 in 1957 and 554,118 in 1956. These collections remain on deposit pending the production of certificates that Income Tax liability has been discharged.

All arrears of Entertainment Tax and Film Tax have been placed in the hands of the Crown Solicitor for recovery by parate execution in terms of section 66 of the Tax Ordinance.

SWEEPSTAKES TAX

7. Football Pools and Frize Drawings continued to affect, adversely, the popularity of the SweeDstake organised by the Demerara Turf Club and this is reflected in the shortfall of 5,832 under this subhead. Unlike the Demerara Turf Club none of these pools, so far as is known, makes any contribution to local charity, as many of them are not of local provenance there is reason to believe that considerable sums of money are diverted overseas with no corresponding benefit. It would appear that the time is ripe for consideration to be given to the cuestion of taxing these Pools.

IEGISLATION

8. An Ordinance to amend the Miscellaneous Licences Ordinance (Chapter 306) received the Governor's assent on 3rd April, 1958. The amending Ordinance (No. 8 of 1958) provides for an increase from \$48 to \$100 of the amount of the fine that may be imposed by a Magistrate for a breach of the licensing laws, and extends the power to adjudicate departmentally in cases where the unpaid duty or instalment does not exceed \$10 to cases where it does not exceed \$50.

BREACHES OF LICENSING LAWS.

9. Departmental vigilance to prevent evasion was maintained during the year and 1751 cases of breaches of licensing laws were detected. Of these 1532 were dealt with departmentally in terms of section 11 of the Miscellaneous Licences Ordinance. Fines collected amounted to 44,808. In 219 cases where the unpaid licence duty exceeded 50 or defaulters did not avail themselves of the option of being dealt with departmentally, summonses were issued. Fines imposed by magistrates amounted to 42,480.

GENERAL

10. The suggestions from the Organisation and Methods Adviser referred to in my 1957 Annual Report have been accepted and implemented.
