I have the honour to submit for the information of His Excellency the Governor, the Annual Report on the work of this Department for the year ended 31st December, 1960.

#### REVENUE.

- 2. The gross revenue collected by the department during 1960 amounted to \$28,426,548.29. After deducting various sums refunded during the year totalling \$101,903.07 the aggregate net revenue was \$28,324,645.22.
- 3. The following table gives particulars of net revenue collected in 1959 and 1960 together with the increase or decrease under each sub-head.

4. Of the total net revenue collected in 1960, approximately 74.2% was derived from import duty, 4.6% from export duty, 17.3% from excise duty on rum, 2.1% from excise duty on beer, 0.4% from other excise duties, 0.7% from licences and 0.7% from other sources. The relative importance of the main revenue heads for the past two years compared with 1954 is indicated below.

A summary of the gross amounts of revenue derived from the principal classes of commodities imported and exported during each of the past five years, is given in Appendix 1.

5. The greatest amount of duty levied on a single commodity in 1960 was \$3,510,714 on tobacco. The yield on this item was 16.7 per cent. of the total import duty collected on all imports for the year. The quantities of imported tobacco cleared for consumption and duty collected thereon during the years 1959 and 1960 were as follows:—

6. The total revenue collected on alcoholic beverages during 1960 was \$6,321,698 showing an increase of \$533,051 over collections for 1959. Of this total, import duty was \$1,247,885 in 1960 as compared with \$827,392 in 1959, while excise duty amounted to \$5,073,813 in 1960 and \$4,961,255 in the previous year. Comparative tables showing the excise and import duties collected on alcoholic beverages and the quantities of such beverages cleared for home consumption during the past ten years are set out in Appendix II to this report.

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7. Comparison of the quantities of Alcoholic beverages and tobacco cleared for home consumption during the year 1960, with those for the year 1951 shows the following percentage increases or decreases over the ten year period.

#### CONCESSIONS TO INDUSTRY.

9. The value of goods imported free of duty under the Industries Aid and Encouragement Ordinance amounted to \$14,611,564 in 1960 as compared with \$7,510,032 in 1959. The increase was due to heavy importations of machinery for use in the Alumina Project at Mackenzie. In addition import duty amounting to \$47,495 was refunded by order of the Governor in Council on goods valued \$923,620.

10. Assistance was given to various industries by concessions of duty free gasolene and draw-back of duty on gasolene at the rate of 21c. per gallon. The amount of duty so remitted amounted to \$315,279 in 1960 as compared with \$296,092 in 1959.

#### **EXPORTS**

14. The total value of goods exported from the Colony during the year 1960 (including goods exported through Parcels Post and the Personal effects of emigrants) was \$127,311,756 as compared with \$104,063,031 in 1959, which shows an increase in the Colony's export trade of \$23,248,725 or 22.3 per cent.

- 15. Exports of domestic produce were valued \$125,050,939 (including stores for ships and aircraft valued \$43,039) in the year 1960 as against \$102,031,151 (including stores \$33,769 in 1959). Exports of foreign produce (re-exports) were valued \$2,260,817 (including stores \$265,267) in 1960 and \$2,031,880 (including stores \$147,110) in 1959.

#### TRADE WITH BRITISH CARIBBEAN TERRITORIES

- 20. The total value of all goods (including the personal and household effects of emigrants) exported to the British Caribbean Territories during the year 1960 was \$20,222,657 of which the value of domestic produce was \$19,440,324. Of the domestic exports 46.6% went to Trinidad, 29.2% to Jamaica, 12.8% to Barbados and 11.4% to the other Territories.
- 21. The value of Imports from the British Caribbean Territories (including the personal and household effects of immigrants) amounted to \$14,701,190 of which 94.0% came from Trinidad, 1.7% from Barbados, 1.0% from St. Lucia 2.9% from Jamaica and 0.4% from the remaining Territories.

#### TRANSHIPMENT TRADE

22. The total value of goods landed in the Colony for transhipment and transhipped during 1960 was \$1,417,571 as compared with \$1,009,395 in 1959 and \$1,272.330 in 1958.

#### SHIPPING

23. There were 2,393 vessels entered at the ports of the Colony during the year 1960 as compared with 2,152 vessels in 1959. The number of vessels cleared during 1960 was 2,321 as against 2,104 vessels in 1959. The following table shows the number and net registered tonnage of shipping entered and cleared at each port of the Colony during the year 1960 together with total increases or decreases in number and tonnage in relation to the previous year.

#### **AIRCRAFT**

24. During 1960, seven Airlines — British West Indian Airways Ltd., Pan American World Airways Inc., K.L.M. Royal Dutch Airlines, Air France, British Overseas Airways Corporation, B.G. Airways (Government) Ltd., and the Brazilian Airways Company (Cruzeiro Do Sul)—operated scheduled flights to and from the Colony. The number of Aircraft entering the Colony increased from 1,276 in 1959 to 1,347 in 1960. The numbers departing were 1,279 in 1959 and 1,342 in 1960.

#### RUM DISTILLATION, COMPOUNDS ETC.

- 25. Seven rum distilleries operated during the year. The quantity of rum produced during 1960 was 2,897,775 proof gallons as compared with 2,895,896 proof gallons in 1959, which shows an increase in production of 1,879 proof gallons or .065 per cent.

- 29. Consumption of locally produced rum fell to 462,513 proof gallons, showing a decrease of 7,387 proof gallons or 1.6 per cent below the previous year. Consumption of local wine fell by 4.3% from 30,905 liquid gallons in 1959. Clearance of gin rose by 587 proof gallons and the total quantity cleared during the year 1960 was 2,068 proof gallons.

- 31. The quantity of beer produced locally during the year 1960 was 795,284 liquid gallons which compared with 733,363 liquid gallons in 1959 shows an increase of 61,921 liquid gallons or 8.4 per cent.
- 32. During the year 1960 the quantity of locally manufactured matches cleared for home consumption was 171,852 gross of boxes not exceeding 60 matches each on which excise duty amounting to \$42,963 was collected. Corresponding figures for 1959 were 170,080 gross boxes and \$42,520 excise duty.

#### STAFF

36. I regret to report the deaths of Mr. J. Godfrey, Class II Guard, on 14th April, 1960, and Mr. J. Trim, Class II Guard, on 12th November, 1960.

Mr. W. J. I. Cox, Supervisor Class I, acted as Assistant Comptroller from 1st March to 12th October, 1960, during the absence on Vacation Leave of Mr. J. R. Hill

During the year under review, seven officers and three Clerical Assistants resigned their posts, four Officers, one Secretary and one Clerical Assistant were transferred to other Government Departments, and the services of one Temporary Officer were terminated. Mr. S. E. Brathwaite, Class I Guard, retired on 31st July, 1960, at the age of 55 years.

On 15th August, Mr. D. A. Abrams and Mr. E. O. Ramjit, Class I Officers, began six-month courses of instruction at the Customs and Excise Training School, Trinidad.

#### REGISTRATION OF SHIPPING

37. Under the Merchant Shipping Act as applied to this Colony by Law of Merchant Shipping Ordinance Chapter 3, the Comptroller continued to carry out the duties of Registrar of Shipping. At Georgetown during the year 1960, twenty-nine vessels with a total net tonnage of 1,408 tons were registered, including one ship of 19 tons which was registered anew, one of 62 tons net was re-registered and the registry of six ships with a total net tonnage of 377 tons closed. On the 31st December, 1960, there were 98 ships with a total of 6,449 tons net remaining on Register at ports of the Colony.

#### GENERAL

- 38. During the year one new Spirit Warehouse was appointed for the storage of rum at Pln. Diamond.
- 39. On the 2nd July, 1960 an area on the right bank Kaituma River, left bank Barima River in the North West District was appointed a place of unloading and loading under Section 2 of the Customs Ordinance, Chapter 309 to be known henceforth as Port Kaituma. Exports of Manganese Ore began in August, 1960 and by 31st December, 1960, 76,765 tons were exported.
- 40. The cost of collecting the Customs and Excise Revenue during the year under review was 2.41 per cent. of the total revenue as compared with 2.46 per cent. in the preceding year.
