I have the honour to submit for the information of His Excellency the Governor, the Annual Report on the work of this Department for the year ended 31st December, 1961.

#### REVENUE.

- 2. The gross revenue collected by the department during 1961 amounted to \$29,876,081.89. After deducting various sums refunded during the year totalling \$44,184.88 the aggregate net revenue was \$29,831,897.01.
- 3. The following table gives particulars of net revenue collections on 1960 and 1961 together with the increase or decrease under each subhead.

4. Of the total net revenue collected in 1961 approximately 74.6% was derived from import duty 3.8% from export duty 17.8% from excise duty on rum 1.9% from excise duty on beer 0.4% from other excise duties 0.7% from licences and 0.8% from other sources. The relative importance of the main revenue heads for the past two years compared with 1955 is indicated below.

A summary of the gross amounts of revenue derived from the principal classes of commodities imported and exported during each of the past five years, is given in Appendix 1.

5. The greatest amount of duty levied on a single commodity in 1961 was \$3,864,821 on tobacco. The yield on this item was 17.3 per cent of the total import duty collected on all imports for the year. The quantities of imported tobacco cleared for home consumption and the duty collected thereon during 1960 and 1961 were as follows:—

6. The total revenue collected on alcoholic beverages during 1961 was \$7,292,033 showing an increase of \$970,335 over collections for 1960. Of this total, import duty was \$1,368,874 in 1961 as compared with \$1,247,885 in 1960, while excise duty amounted to \$5,923,159 in 1961 and \$5,073,813 in the previous year. Comparative tables showing the excise and import duties collected on alcoholic beverages and the quantities of such beverages cleared for home consumption during the past ten years are set out in Appendix II to this report.

7. Comparison of the quantities of alcoholic beverages and tobacco cleared for home consumption during the year 1961 with those for the year 1952 shows the following percentage increases or decreases over the ten year period.

#### CONCESSIONS TO INDUSTRY.

- 9. The value of goods imported free of duty under the Industries Aid and Encouragement Ordinance amounted to \$1,746,374 in 1961 as compared with \$14,611,564 in 1960. In addition import duty amounting to \$34,347 was refunded by order of the Governor in Council on goods valued \$308,096.
- 10. Assistance was given to various industries by concessions of duty free gasolene and drawback of duty on gasolene at the rate of 21 cents per gallon. The amount of duty so remitted amounted to \$281,977 in 1961 as compared with \$315,279 in 1960.

#### **EXPORTS**

14. The total value of goods exported from the Colony during the year 1961 (including goods exported through Parcels Post and the personal effects of emigrants) was \$148,863,190 as compared with \$127,311,756 in 1960 which shows an increase in the Colony's Export Trade of \$21,551,434 or 16.9 per cent.

- 15. Exports of domestic produce were valued \$146,545,155 (including stores for ships and aircraft valued \$41,859) in the year 1961 as against \$125,050,939 (including stores \$43,039 in 1960. Exports of foreign produce (re-exports) were valued \$2,318,035 (including stores \$572,410) in 1961 and \$2,260,817 (including stores \$265,267) in 1960.

#### TRADE WITH BRITISH CARIBBEAN TERRITORIES

- 20. The total value of all goods (including the personal and household effects of emigrants exported to the British Caribbean Territories during the year 1961 was \$23,801,889 of which the value of domestic produce was \$23,128,994 of the domestic exports 60.6% went to Trinidad 18.7% to Jamaica 10.4% to Barbados and 10.3% to the other territories.
- 21. The value of Imports from the British Caribbean Territories (including the personal and household effects of immigrants) amounted to \$16,110,301 of which 94% came from Trinidad, 2.4% from Barbados 1.4% from St. Lucia 2.1% from Jamaica and 0.1% from the remaining territories.

#### TRANSHIPMENT TRADE

22. The total value of goods landed in the Colony for transhipment and transhipped during 1961 was \$909,451 as compared with \$1,417,571 in 1960 and \$1,009,395 in 1959.

#### SHIPPING

23. There was 2,452 vessels entered at the ports of the Colony during the year 1961 as compared with 2,393 vessels in 1960. The number of vessels cleared during 1961 was 2,331 as against 2,321 vessels in 1960. The following table shows the number and net registered tonnage of shipping entered and cleared at each port of the Colony during the year 1961 together with total increase or decreases in number and tonnage in relation to the previous year.

#### **AIRCRAFT**

24. During 1961, seven Airlines—British West Indian Airways Ltd., Pan American World Airways Inc., K.L.M. Royal Dutch Airlines, Air France, British Overseas Airways Corporation, B.G. Airways (Government) Ltd., and the Brazilian Airways Company (Cruzeiro De Sul)—operated scheduled flights to and from the Colony. The numbers of Aircraft entering the Colony increased from 1,347 in 1960 to 1,447 in 1961. The numbers departing were 1,342 in 1960 and 1,445 in 1961.

#### RUM DISTILLATION, COMPOUNDS ETC.

- 25. Six rum distilleries operated during the year. The quantity of rum produced during 1961 was 2,790,833 proof gallons as compared with 2,897,775 proof gallons in 1960, which shows a decrease in production of 106,942 proof gallons or 3.7 per cent.

29. Comsumption of locally produced rum rose to 555,120 proof gallons showing an increase of 92,607 proof gallons or 20 per cent above the previous year. Consumption of local wine fell by 17 per cent from 29,595 gallons in 1960. Clearances of gin rose by 18 proof gallons and the total quantity cleared during the year 1961 was 2,086 proof gallons.

- 32. The quantity of beer cleared for home consumption during the year 1961 was 691,779 Liquid gallons which compared with 795,284 liquid gallons in 1960 shows a decrease of 103,505 liquid gallons or 13 per cent.
- 33. During the year 1961 the quantity of locally manufactured matches cleared for home consumption was 194,816 gross of boxes not exceeding 60 matches each on which excise duty amounting to \$48,704 was collected. Corresponding figures for 1960 were 171,852 gross boxes and \$42,963 excise duty.

#### REGISTRATION OF SHIPPING

38. Under the Merchant Shipping Act as applied to this Colony by Law of Merchant Shipping Ordinance, Chapter 3, the Comptroller continued to carry out the duties of Registrar of Shipping. At Georgetown during the year 1961, six vessels with a total net tonnage of 259 tons were registered, including one vessel of 130 tons which was registered anew. The registry of five vessels with a total net tonnage of 295 tons was closed. On 31st December, 1961, there were 99 ships with a total of 6,413 tons net remaining on Register at ports of the Colony.

#### GENERAL

- 39. On 11th March, 1961, a fire occurred at the Government and Queen's Warehouses, formerly known as the Colonial Bonded Warehouse, at Stabroek, Georgetown. There was a total destruction of Government building, offices, stores and furniture, and a complete loss of warehoused and unentered goods.
- 40. Alternative warehousing accommodation has been provided for at the Government Spirit Warehouse, Kingston; but it is confined to tobacco, cigarettes, cigars, wines, liqueurs, bitters, cordials, and spirits other than perfumed spirits, because of the limited storage facilities of the building which has also been approved as a Queen's Warehouse for the deposit of goods required to be so stored.
- 41. Nine new private warehouses were consequently approved for the storage of warehouse goods other than those specified at paragraph 40.
- 42. The southern portion of the terminal building at Atkinson Field was appointed a Government Warehouse; and an agreement was and Messrs. D. A. Thani of Lot 15, Water Street, of a booth in the Terminal Building for the sale of certain goods free of import duty to tourists, intransit and outgoing passengers.
- 43. The cost of collecting the Customs and Excise Revenue during the year under review was 2.43 per cent of the total revenue as compared with 2.41 per cent in the preceding year.
