SILWFC'S MANDATE

The Sugar Industry Labour Welfare Fund Committee was established by law in 1947 to provide for the improvement of social and public health conditions among workers in the Sugar Industry, with special reference to housing, sanitation and potable water supply and recreational facilities.


PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Principal activities of the organization are focused on the improvement of housing, roads and the social and public health conditions of Sugar Workers. The organization has also been significantly involved in house lot allocation, conveying Titles, issuing interest free loans and giving Water Subsidies to sugar workers who have met the qualifying requirements.

In accordance with Regulation 10 of The Sugar Industry Labour Welfare Fund Regulations made under The Sugar Industry Special Funds Act Chapter 69:03, the members of the Committee appointed by the Honourable Minister of Labour to administer the Sugar Industry Labour Welfare Fund, take the honour of submitting the report on the administration of the Fund for the year 2014.

(1) MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE

At the beginning of the year, the Committee comprised of two Public Officers, three Trade Union Representatives, three Representatives from the Guyana Sugar Corporation and one Representative from the Cane Farmers Association.

(2) JOB EVALUATION

A job evaluation exercise was done in the year 2014. An average pay to the employees was twelve percent. Two percent for each completed year of service in the current position up to a maximum of ten years.

(3) PROMOTION

The Confidential Secretary was promoted as the Principal Assistant Secretary with effect from December 1, 2014.

(4) FINANCIAL STRUCTURE

As at 31 December 2014, Net Surplus was \$14,355,491 (fourteen million, three hundred and fifty five thousand, four hundred and ninety one dollars).

(5) WAGES AND SALARIES

The Guyana Agricultural and General Workers Union (GAWU) remains the sole bargaining agent for the employees at SILWFC. In 2014 the employees received an increase of **two (2) percent** across the Board.

(6) INCREASE IN REPAIR AND EXTENSION LOAN

On February 21, 2014 the Board took a decision to increase the Repair and Extension Loan from \$200,000 to \$500,000 with a repayment rate of \$2,500 weekly effective March, 2014.

(7) BURSARY AWARDS FOR CHILDREN OF THE SUGAR INDUSTRY LABOUR WELFARE FUND COMMITTEE (SILWFC) EMPLOYEES

The Committee has awarded four bursary awards to children of The Sugar Industry Labour Welfare Fund Committee employees at a tune of \$33,000.

(8) BURSARY AWARD FOR CHILDREN OF SUGAR WORKERS

On May 30, 2013, it was decided that SILWFC award two (2) bursaries for children of sugar workers one each from Berbice and Demerara for a **four (4)** years period.

(10) SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

On July 16, 2013, it was decided that SILWFC partner with GuySuCo in granting scholarship to two (2) of GuySuCo's Cadets annually. It is one method of binding them to serve the corporation on the completion of their studies, since the scope of employment is limited at SILWFC and their skills would be utilized to the maximum by GuySuCo which will help GuySuCo to perform better in the future and that SILWFC also will be benefitted because SILWFC's operation is dependent on the production of sugar. The cadets will be bond to GuySuCo.

It was also agreed that GuySuCo pay the cadets their salaries, since they are bonafide employees of GuySuCo and the areas of study <u>must</u> be relevant to the operation of GuySuCo and The Sugar Industry Labour Welfare Fund Committee (SILWFC) pays for the scholarship package i.e **Tuition Fee and Book allowance**.

The awards cover tuition fee and book allowance per cadets.






(19) CONVEYANCING OF TITLES AND SECOND TRANSFERS

- (i) The Committee continues to convey Certificates of Title to sugar workers who were leased land in the Extra Nuclear Housing Areas and to those who were allocated house lots in new housing areas developed by the Committee.
- (ii) A total of **48** applications were received and processed in **2014**. **66** applicants paid for their titles, and this number represented **4** applicants who applied in **2014** and **72** applicants who applied in previous years. **40** Transfers were filed at the Land Registry and **72** Certificates of Title were uplifted from the Land Registry from transfer filed in previous years and delivered to the Registered Proprietors.
- (iii) During the period under review **nineteen (19)** Registered Proprietors applied to the Committee for transfer of their properties to which SILWFC complied.
- (iv) Proceeds from the sale of the lots for the year **2014** totaled **\$560,385** were deposited into the Fund.




The pie chart represents the sources of receipts as percentage of the total receipts
