1. Accounting Policies:

(a) Incorporation and Principal Activity

- (I) The Guyana Water Incorporated was incorporated in Guyana on May 30, 2002 under the Companies Act, 1991. The company was formed out of a merger between the Guyana Water Authority (GUYWA) and the Georgetown Sewerage and Water Commissioners (GS & WC). The principal activities of the company are as follows:
 - The supply of potable water to the citizens of Guyana.
 - The provision of sewerage disposal services to the residents of Central Georgetown.
 - Operation and maintenance of the water and underground sewerage system in Guyana.
 - Customer billing and collection of tariffs for the services provided.

The Company's registered office is at Vlissengen Road, Bel Air, Georgetown, Guyana.

(II) Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

These Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the measurement at fair value revaluation of property, plant and equipment and financial instruments. Historic cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

(ii) Significant Accounting Policies (Cont'd)

(b) Foreign Currencies

Items included in the Financial Statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates. The Financial Statements are presented in Guyana dollars, which is the Company's functional currency. Transactions involving foreign currencies are translated into prevailing rate at the dates of those transactions. Foreign currency gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of the monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

(c) Fixed Assets - Property, Plant and Equipment

Fixed Assets (Property, plant and equipment) are stated at cost less accumulated Expenditure on assets, which will benefit the company economically for a period greater than the current financial accounting period, is capitalized and written off over the useful life of the assets.

Individual assets or groups of items making up a single identifiable asset of value less than \$15,000 are not capitalized but are expensed in the accounting period in which the costs are incurred.

1(ii) Accounting Policies (Cont'd)

(c) Fixed Assets - Property, Plant and Equipment (Cont'd)

The capitalized asset value of purchased assets is measured at the full cost of bringing the assets to working condition for the intended use. Self constructed assets are stated at the accumulated cost of purchased elements together with the element of internal cost incurred in constructing the asset. These elements include materials, labour, consultancy fees, overheads (direct and indirect) and other additional costs. Finance costs that are directly attributable to the construction of tangible assets are capitalized as part of the cost of those assets. Capitalization of finance costs ceases when the asset is brought into use.

Subsequent expenditure on existing assets is capitalized where the expenditure provides an enhancement of the economic benefits of the asset in excess of the previously assessed standard of performance.

Assets are reviewed from impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use.

ii) Significant Accounting Policies (Cont'd)

(d) Depreciation

Depreciation on all property, plant & equipment is charged on a straight-line basis. The rates used are expected to write off the value of the assets over their useful economic lives. The annual depreciation rates used as per asset classification are as follows:

Depreciation is not charged on land and work in progress. The useful life of assets capitalized from work in progress commences when the assets involved have been completed and are put into use in the company. Depreciation is charged in the year of capitalization which is in compliance with the Fixed Asset Policy.

(ii) Significant Accounting Policies (Cont'd)

(f) Income Recognition

Turnover comprises billed sales of water and sewer services to customers. Tariffs payable by customers are determined by reference to the Company's licence. Income is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Income is reduced for estimated invoices by issuance of adjustments as appropriate. Interest revenue is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Company and the amount can be measured reliably. Interest revenue is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the investment amount and at the effective interest rate applicable.

(g) Provision for Impairment of Receivables

Provision is made in these Financial Statements for amounts included in accounts receivable of which the eventual cash realization is considered remote. Provision is based on the company's Financial Regulations and is disclosed in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of past events; it is probable that the Company will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the obligation.

The amount that is shown as provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the obligation at the Statement of Financial Position date.

entity recognises expenses for the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate,
which in the case of grants related to assets requires setting up the grant as deferred income or
deducting it from the carrying amount of the asset.

Amendments to IAS 1 - Presentation of Financial Statements (Annual Improvements to IFRS 2009 - 2011 Cycle)

The amendments relevant to the company specify that a third statement of financial position is required when a) an entity applies an accounting policy retrospectively, or makes a retrospective restatement or reclassification of items in its financial statements, and b) the retrospective application, restatement or reclassification has a material effect on the information in the third statement of financial position.

In the current year, the company has applied IAS 20 (as discussed before) which has resulted in material effects on the information in the statement of financial position as at 31 December, 2012. As such the company has presented a third statement of financial position as at 31 December, 2012.

(j) Inventories - maintenance spares

Maintenance spares are stated at the lower of cost, as determined on a weighted average basis, and net realizable value. Provision is made for obsolete, slow moving and defective stocks.

(k) Employee Benefits

The Company operates a defined benefit plan for it's employees who are on the fixed establishment. The Company's pension and gratuities paid to long -serving employees are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income when paid. No other post retirement benefits are provided for these employees. The Company has issued public a tender in 2014 for a Defined Contribution Scheme and an award has been made to Assuria (Guyana) Inc. This pension scheme has been implemented in February 2015.

Grants Related to Expense: Energy Cost supplied by the Guyana Power and Light (Inc)

Government grant is recognized only when received, is treated as other income and offset against electricity liability of Guyana Power and Light Inc.

Grants Related to Capital Works

Management seeks to minimize potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Company by applying procedures to appropriately identify, evaluate and manage these risks.

1.1 Foreign Currency Risk

Currency risk is the risk that the value of an monetary asset or liability fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. Management accepts the risk and would take the gain or loss on the transaction to the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

1.2. Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to its trade and other receivables. The amounts presented in the Statement of Financial Position are net of allowances of impairment. High risk accounts are monitored and pursued to maximize collection. Principal classes of gross trade receivables as shown in note 5.1.

1.3 Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk, also referred to as funding risk, is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in raising funds to meet its commitments. Liquidity risk may result from an inability to sell a financial asset quickly at close to its fair value. Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash, and the availability of funding through an adequate amount of committed credit facilities. Due to the dynamic nature of the underlying businesses, the management of the Company aims at maintaining flexibility in funding by keeping committed lines of credit available. All financial assets and liabilities as shown on the Statement of Financial Position are contractually payable within one year of the Statement of Financial Position date. The Company also receive subvention funds from the Government to settle liabilities as they fall due.

Ultimate responsibility for risk management rests with the Board of Directors of the Company.

13. Deferred Income Write-off

AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF GUYANA WATER INC. FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2014

The audit of the books and accounts of Guyana Water Inc. for the year ended 31 December, 2014, has resulted in the following report which is forwarded for your comments and such actions as considered necessary.

We have examined certain aspects of the company's system of internal accounting controls and made recommendations on possible ways in which the system might be improved to overcome the weaknesses which we observed during the examination.

It must be appreciated that the matter dealt with in this report came to our notice during conduct of our normal audit which was designed primarily to enable us to express an opinion on the company's financial statements. Our comments cannot, therefore, be expected to include all possible improvements in the internal control which a more extensive special examination may develop.

The audit was conducted in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing, issued by the International Federation of Accountants (IFAC). These standards required that the audit be planned and performed to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatements.

Scope and Methodology

In conducting financial and compliance audits our office examined in such manner as we deemed necessary the relevant financial statements and accounts to ascertain whether:

- The financial statements have been properly prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and properly present the operations and affairs of Engineering and Agricultural Consultants Inc.
- The accounts have been faithfully and properly kept.
- The rules, procedures and internal management controls are sufficient to secure effective control on the assessment, collection and proper allocation of revenues.
- All monies expended and charged to an account have been applied to the purpose or purposes for which they were intended.
- Essential records are maintained and the internal controls and the rules and procedures established and applied are sufficient to safeguard the control of stores and other properties of the company.

Findings and Recommendations

1. Expense Vouchers

Condition

There were a number of expense vouchers that could not be presented for audit examination when requested. (see appendix 1)

Effect

We were unable to ascertain whether these expenses were actually incurred and bonafide.

It is important that all source documents be kept so as to provide an audit trail and also for future reference of the transactions.

Recommendation

We recommend that the company ensure that 'hard copies' of all expense vouchers are prepared and that these are properly stored.

Management Response

All payment vouchers and contract files noted on Appendix 1 are available for your review.

2. Non-current Assets

a. Assets not on asset register

Condition:

During our audit we identified a number of assets that were on the premises of GWI but could not be located on the non-current asset register (see appendix 2).

Effect:

The purpose of the non-current asset register is to record and control the assets which will help to aid in the physical verification of such assets. Assets that were physically identified but not located on the asset register could either have been mislabeled or were not recorded at all. This represents a significant weakness in controls over the recording of purchased assets and the movements of assets.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company carry out a full scale asset verification exercise ensuring that all assets are adequately labeled and present on the asset register.

Management response

We acknowledge your findings and have since commenced a comprehensive verification exercise that will seek to recount 100% of the Company's assets. Recounting and relabeling of all assets will be done to ensure concurrence of physical assets with the Fixed Asset Register.

b. Assets not in working condition on asset register

Condition:

During our physical verification we noted that there were some assets that were not in a working condition but were still present on the asset register.

Effect:

There were non-current assets on the asset register that were not in a working condition. It is important that the asset register be kept up-to-date as this keeps track of the correct value of assets, which allows for computation of depreciation and for tax and insurance purposes.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the company carries out a full scale physical verification exercise identifying assets that are not in a working condition. Once such assets have been identified, they should be written off.

Management response

These were computer hardware and peripherals that were defective and will be disposed of in accordance with Company's asset disposal policy.

Management will make a comprehensive review of all non-current assets to ensure that these are in working order and seek to write off those that are not.

c. Asset register and identification of assets

Condition:

During our audit we identified instances where the codes present on assets did not match the codes on the asset register or where assets did not bear any codes. The purpose of the non-current assets register is to record and control the assets which will help to aid in the physical verification of such assets. Each asset should have adequate markings on them which will enable identification with the items appearing on the register. In addition these markings should be consistent and match the codes on the asset register. (see appendix 3).

Effect:

It is important that all assets are correctly coded as this serves as an important internal control aiding to physically verify assets and track its movement. The lack of correct codes on assets represents a significant weakness and can result in assets being misappropriated without the knowledge of the company.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company adequately maintain its non-current asset register and affix separate identification numbers on all assets and ensure that these codes are in agreement with the asset register.



Management response

Based on your finding we have since relabeled those assets and have since commenced a comprehensive verification exercise that will seek to recount 100% of the Company's assets. Recounting and relabeling of all assets will be done to ensure concurrence of asset physically present with the Fixed Asset Register.

d. Approved asset policy

Condition:

The company did not provide an approved asset policy manual when requested by the auditors.

Effect:

There is no Board approved asset policy meaning that asset capitalization policy, depreciation rates, disposal policy are not authorized.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company implements a Board approved complete asset policy manual.

Management Response

The approved Fixed Asset Policy is available for your review. This policy was approved by the Board of Directors at the 86th Statutory Board of Director meeting held on 31st March 2010. Management will seek to provide you with this approved asset policy.

e. Impairment review

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that the company did not carry out an impairment review of noncurrent assets during the year or if such a review was carried there was no documented report.

Effect:

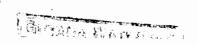
It is important that the company carry out a physical verification of non-current assets so as to ascertain whether any of these assets are damaged or not in a working condition and subsequently impaired. As a result, non-current assets may be carried overstated as the asset register may not be updated to account for impaired assets.

Recommendation:

We recommended that the company carry a full scale non-current asset verification and impairment exercise.

Management response

The Company has a Plant Property & Maintenance (PPM) program. All productive assets (boreholes performance, treatment plants and other ancillary assets) are currently being reviewed based on their performance and corrective actions are being taken to ensure that their



capacity is not being impaired. However, management will seek to conduct a full impairment review of all of the company's assets.

f Disposals

Condition:

It was initially represented to the auditors that there were no disposals for the year 2014. Upon further enquiry, we were provided with a list of disposals that consisted of 19 assets. This list of disposals was not approved nor did it contain all relevant information such as the asset code for the items disposed.

Effect:

It is important that the company safeguard all of its assets. Assets should not be disposed unless such disposal has been properly authorized. In addition, there should be proper record keeping of all assets disposed or assets to be disposed. As such we could not ascertain:

- whether there was relevant approval for the assets disposed;
- whether the list of disposals was complete;
- whether the assets listed as disposed were actually removed from the asset register;
- what assets are currently not operational and are being held to be disposed of at a future date.

Recommendation:

We recommended that the company keep adequate and complete records for assets to be disposed of and actually disposals and ensure that disposals are properly authorized. In addition, the list of disposals must be complete with all necessary information relation to the disposed asset and the asset should be removed from the asset register.

Management response

Management acknowledges your findings and will seek to ensure that these disposals are properly accounted for, that the disposal listing is up-to-date and approved. In addition, management will seek to update its asset register ensuring that all disposals are taken into account and are promptly taken off the register.

g. Disposed Assets not on the Disposal Schedule

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that there were assets that were tendered for and sold but not on the disposal schedule and subsequently would not have been adjusted for on the asset register.

Effect:

The asset register will be incorrect as these assets were disposed but not adjusted for. In addition this represents a significant control deficiency as assets are being sold without the necessary adjustments being made to company's records.

These assets were as follows:

Atlas corpo compressor 185 – Tender sum \$109,000 Awarded to Bridge Raaj Ramjit



- Nissan Frontier PGG 6343 Tender sum \$301,000 Awarded to Nazim Ally
- Toyota Hilux PGG 8764 Tender sum \$701,000 Awarded to Nazim Ally

We recommended that the company ensure that all disposals are properly documented and are immediately taken off the asset register.

Response

Please refer to comments above in "f" above and Table 1. Management will seek to update its asset register ensuring that all disposals are taken into account and are promptly taken off the register.

i. Acquired Assets with nil value

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that there were a number of assets acquired during the year ending 31 December, 2014 that were recorded at nil acquisition value. (see appendix 4)

Effect:

The asset register will be incorrect as these as assets are apparently being acquired at nil value. It could be that these assets were acquired in previous years but were never recorded and are now being recorded for the first time; however, because of the lapse in time their values could not be ascertained by the company and are therefore recorded as nil.

Recommendation:

We recommended that the company carry a full scale non-current asset verification exercise, in the process ascertaining the correct value of all assets and updating the company's asset register. If the values cannot be ascertained then the assistance of duly experienced professionals should be used to determine the value of the assets.

Management response

The information was incorrectly presented during the audit. We have extracts of the codes to corroborate that these assets have values. Refer to extract from Fixed Asset Register attached.

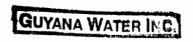
j. Asset register

Condition:

The company does not have an updated and accurate asset register.

Effect:

It is important that the company's fixed asset register be kept in order to keep track of details of each fixed asset, ensuring control and preventing misappropriation of assets. It also keeps track of the correct value of assets, which allows for computation of depreciation and for tax and insurance purposes. The fixed asset register allows a company to keep track of its fixed assets.



We recommended that the company maintain an adequate and complete fixed asset register ensuring that all additions and disposals are properly and accurately accounted for.

Management response

Management has since begun a process to reconcile the company's asset register with the lists of additions and disposals to identify any variances and ensure the asset register is up-to-date.

K. Motor Vehicles

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that there were vehicles on the asset register of the Company which was registered in the name of the Ministry of Housing and Water. From our audit sample, these were the vehicles:

- PSS9198
- PRR5294
- PRR5312
- GPP8846

Effect:

It is unclear the reason why these vehicles are registered in the name of the Ministry of Housing and Water though the Company clearly bears the risks and rewards of these vehicles.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Company seek to have these vehicles transferred from the name Ministry of Housing and Water to the Guyana Water Inc.

Management response

Motor Vehicles PSS9198, PRR5294 & PRR5312 were recent duty free purchases made by the Company. All duty free applications were processed through the then "Ministry of Housing & Water", therefore the vehicles were registered in the Ministry's name. After the expiration of three (3) years ownership will be transferred to GWI.

Motor Vehicle GPP8846 was purchased under the Georgetown Sanitation Improvement Programme (GSIP). This project comes to an end in December 2015. Ownership will be transferred to GWI upon closure of the Programme.



L. Land

Condition:

Leases / transports could not be presented for audit verification for the following lands:

- Land Shelter belt, division three. taxes need to be paid on the land (rates and taxes)
- Land 'D' Edward, division four.
- Land Ithaca, division four.
- Land Queenstown water T.P., division five.
- Land New Amsterdam, division five.
- Land Spring land pump station, division five.
- Land Amsterdam Leguan, division one.

Effect:

We were unable to ascertain whether the Company are legal owners of these lands.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Company seek to have leases / deeds for all lands on its asset register and ensure that these are securely stored.

Management response

Refer to comments below:

- Land Shelter belt, division three. land was acquired by cabinet in 2008, rates & taxes are paid by the owner and not the occupier
- Land 'D' Edward, division four. GWI Plan #122 demarcates property for transfer
- Land Ithaca, division four. GWI Plan #32 demarcates property for transfer
- Land Queenstown water T.P, division five. GWI Plan #124, being processed by CHPA
- Land New Amsterdam, division five. follow up with CHPA
- Land Spring land pump station, division five. Owned via Certificate of Title 2006/85
- Land Amsterdam Leguan, division one. GWI Plan #82 demarcates property for transfer

All outstanding titles will be pursued.

3. Annual Return

Condition:

Under the Companies Act, every company is required, once at least in a year, to make an annual return. The annual return signed by a director or the secretary of the company shall be lodged with the Registrar within forty two days after the annual general meeting.



Also, as per the Companies Act, there shall be annexed to the annual return, a written copy, certified both by a director and by the secretary of the company to be a true copy, of the financial statements.

We noted that the Corporation has never filed any such returns.

Effect:

The Corporation is not in compliance with the requirements of the Companies Act and hence the Laws of Guyana and the Registrar of Companies may remove the Corporation from its register for non-compliance with this filing requirement.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company make a special effort to comply with the Companies Act and file annual return.

Management response

We acknowledge your findings and these matters are currently under review.

4. Customer Database

Condition:

The company's customers' database is not up-to-date.

Effect:

There are customers on the database whose customer information is not up-to-date (see point 10).

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company carry out a full scale customer verification exercise in order to update its customer database.

Management Response

Management is in the ongoing process of updating its customer database and ensuring that relevant contact information is available.

5. Inventory

Condition:

The amount of G\$651,133,774 was reported as inventory for the year ending 31st December 2014 which was arrived at on the basis of physical inventory as at balance sheet date.

The Company did not carry out an exercise to identify slow moving or obsolete stocks for a number of years. Upon request of the auditors the company carried out such an exercise. This resulted in an increase in the provision for slow moving and obsolete stocks to G\$367,163,220 from G\$1,673,034 for the previous year a variance of G\$365,490,186. The report for slow



moving or obsolete stocks was presented at the completion of the audit and we were unable to carry out any further test to substantiate this.

In addition, the report submitted to the auditors was not approved.

According to IAS 2 Inventories, inventories shall be measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of inventories shall comprise all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Weakness:

The company had previously understated its provision for slow moving and obsolete stocks resulting in an overstatement of inventory reported in the Statement of Financial Position. In addition, the failure to carry out regular exercises to identify slow moving and obsolete stocks results in poor controls and the company failing to identify at an early stage such inventory and take necessary corrective action.

Moreover, the report for slow moving or obsolete stocks was not approved and was carried out on an adhoc basis.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the Company carry out an exercise to identify slow moving and obsolete stocks at least once a year and maintain adequate and approved records to as it relates to this exercise.

Management response

The inventory listing of obsolete stock was misrepresented at the time of the audit. Management will seek in the coming year to carry out a full scale inventory review identifying slow moving or obsolete stock.

6. Journals:

Condition

Audit examination revealed that there were journals which had inadequate or no narration. (see appendix 5).

Effect:

It is important that journals contain adequate narration before they are posted into the system as this serves as an important internal control as well as aiding in identifying errors. Additionally, it is important so as to provide an audit trail and also for future reference of the transactions.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company ensure that all journals contain adequate narration.



Management response

Below are the narrations for the journals identified; however, management will seek to ensure that all journals contain adequate narration in the future. (See page 15)

7. Debt Recovery Department

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that the company does not have a functioning debt recovery department.

Effect:

The company has no formal plan or policy as it relates to the recovery of outstanding debts. The company is managing its receivables poorly and as a result outstanding receivables as at 31 December, 2014 totaled \$6,093,664,333 before taking account of provisioning. Receivables outstanding for more than 365 days as at 31 December, 2014 totaled \$3,225,605,400.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company establish a debt recovery department and ensure that this department is fully operational.

Management Response

The Company has already taken a proactive approach to collect overdue amounts from customers by employing a Debt Recovery Manager who will be working closely with the Divisional Managers to collect all amounts overdue while ensuring that current billings are collected within the Company's credit period.

7. Taxes

Condition:

Audit examination revealed the company has never submitted Corporation and Property Tax Returns to the GRA.

Effect:

The company is not compliance with local tax legislation. In addition, interest charges for late submissions will continue to be incurred until the company fulfills its obligations.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company brings itself in compliance with the local tax requirements by filing all outstanding returns and paying backdated taxes as applicable.

Management response

A provisional sum was made in the Financial Statements. This is currently under review by management and the Board.

7. PAYE Submissions

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that the company incorrectly calculated PAYE for a number of staff and the GRA monthly PAYE deduction remittance form was incorrectly filled out and submitted. (see appendix 6).

Effect:

The company has incorrectly filled out its GRA monthly PAYE deduction remittance forms and has incorrectly calculated PAYE for a number of employees and is in breach of the requirements of PAYE for those employees.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company ensure that PAYE is correctly calculated for all staff and that the GRA monthly PAYE deduction remittance forms are correctly filled in. In addition, there should be a system of recheck before these forms are submitted to identify and correct such errors.

Management response

We acknowledge your findings and this will be corrected.

8. <u>VAT</u>

Condition:

Audit examination revealed that the VAT payable and recoverable amounts in the general ledger differ from the amounts reported and submitted to the GRA on the monthly VAT forms. (see appendix 7.)

Effect:

There is a difference between the VAT recoverable amounts reported in the Statement of Financial Position. This results in an unreconciled difference. The reason for the difference was explained as the VAT forms being incorrectly filled out.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company urgently seek to reconcile the difference between the amounts stated on the VAT forms and the general ledger.

Management response

We acknowledge that the Value Added Tax Return (VAT) Forms were incorrectly filled as there were some duplicated entries which were subsequently corrected in December 2014 claims.



8. Register of Company Seal

Condition:

The register of the Company's seal was not made available for inspection upon request by the auditors.

Effect:

We could not ascertain whether the company has a register of seal and if it is being used correctly.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company maintain a Register of the Company Seal if one is not kept and ensure that all use of the Company's Seal is correctly and promptly recorded.

Management response

We agree with your recommendation. This will be implemented from 2016.

9. Provision for Doubtful Debts

Condition:

The provision for doubtful debts in the trial balance for the year ending 31 December, 2014 was \$3,920,442,643. The previous year's provision was \$4,039,222,312. Audit examination revealed that the decrease in provision was as a result of bad debts of \$118,779,669 being incorrectly written off with the entries **Dr**: Provision for Doubtful Debts and **Cr**: Receivables.

This was subsequently corrected upon the request of the auditors with the entries **Dr**: Bad Debts and **Cr**: Provision for Doubtful Debts. The result was that the provision for doubtful debts increased to \$4,039,222,312, the same amount as in 2013, meaning that the Company had not made any changes to the provision.

Upon request of the auditors, management carry out a review of the provision and an amount of \$3,393,556,121 was then recognized as the new required provision for 2014.

Weakness:

The fact that the provision for doubtful debts had not changed from 2013 to 2014 indicates that management was not adequately monitoring the receivables balance and carrying out the necessary calculations to arrive at a suitable amount for the provision.

In addition, the Company's approved 'debt write-off policy' requires that if "the debt is aged greater than a period of 3 years for which no payments were made on account", then that debt should be classified as a bad debt and written off according to prescribed rules.

However, the Company did not write-off such debts but rather made a provision for these.



We recommend that the Company closely monitor its receivables ensuring that the provision for doubtful debts is correctly calculated and that all assumptions used are prudent.

In addition, the company such seek to follow its approved 'debt write-off policy'.

Management response

The provision for bad has decreased by \$645,666,191 as a result of a review for the financial year 2014. The Company is reviewing the current Debt Write off Policy to include a more comprehensive approach to write offs and provisioning for bad debts.

Some key strategies identified and are currently being implemented include:

- The Company has already taken a proactive approach to collect overdue amounts from customers by employing a Debt Recovery Manager who will be working closely with the Divisional Managers to collect all amounts overdue while ensuring that current billings are collected within the Company's credit period.
- The current metered customers are being reviewed and there will be more stringent reading, billing and delivering customers' bills which are intended to decrease the length of credit period currently extended to customers and improve cash flows.
- Unmetered customers quarterly billing cycle has also being reviewed and these
 categories of customers will be transitioned to monthly billing and delivering of bills
 which would improve cash flows and decrease receivables.
- A short term consultant has been employed to review all pending billing adjustments which would impact on a reduction of the receivable balance in order to arrive at the corrected customers' balances and would complement the above strategies.



10. Receivables Confirmation

Condition:

As part of our audit procedures, we conducted a receivables confirmation via telephone of eighty customers.

The results are as follows:

Weakness:

This substantiates the fact that the Company's customers' database is not up-to-date with relevant customer information.

There are non-existent customers on the database and these customers are still being billed for water services. This results in an overstatement of revenue and the receivables. In addition, there is customer information that is not up-to-date.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the company carry out a full scale customer verification exercise in order to update its customer database.

Management Response *No comments*.

12. Insurance

Condition:

During our audit it was discovered that the company does not maintain adequate insurance coverage to safeguard its assets from potential loss. See table below:

Effect:

It is prudent to have insurance coverage for the company's assets so that in the event of loss and/or damage the company will be adequately covered.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the company consider the need for adequate insurance coverage for its assets.

Management response:

We agree with your recommendation. This will be looked into in the year coming year.

13. Deferred Income Write-off

It was noted that the company did not previously off-set grants received with the relevant expenses incurred.

There was previously no matching of grants received and expenses that the grants were used on. As such these grants continued to be shown as a liability with the corresponding expenses being overstated.

The company correctly adjusted for this in the current year's financial statements with the necessary restatements. However, for the deferred income written off for the years 2002-2008, no documents could be presented for audit verification. Below is a summary of the amount written off by year:
