4. DEPLORABLE STATE OF FOREST ROADS AND BRIDGES IN REGION NO. 10

By Mr David Patterson:

(i) Could the Honourable Minister acknowledge that the forest roads and bridges within Region No. 10 are in a deplorable state?

The Speaker: Is that the only question you have?

Mr David Patterson: No. There are five parts.

The Speaker: Let us get the answer to the first one first. Is it one question in three parts?

Mr David Patterson: One question in five parts.

The Speaker: Yes, Honourable Member, proceed with the whole question.

By Mr David Patterson:

- (ii) Could the Honourable Minister acknowledge that the above situation has been brought on by poor road alignment, sub-standard road and bridge construction and a lack of maintenance?
- (iii) Could the Honourable Minister accept that the prevailing situation is a potential disaster in waiting especially to the environment through soil erosion and water/stream contamination?
- (iv) What action is being taken to prevent the potential for loss of life and limb and to ensure the safety of members of the public who traverse these roads daily?

(v) What mitigation measures are being taken to stem the current state of environmental degradation along the roads and water ways?

The Speaker: The Honourable Minister of Agriculture.

Hon Robert M Persaud: Mr Speaker, in response to the questions posed, I wish to state that the questions concern forest roads and bridges in Region 10 and that it why my colleague shoved it in my end. But I wish to make it clear that the Guyana Forestry Commission neither repairs nor build roads in any forested area. These infrastructure works are done by the respective concessionaires and in the case of Region 10, which I think the Member is referring to that would fall under a private Company UNAMCO. So the answer to the first question is no, but bridges along the UNAMCO Road are in need of repairs and I am speaking here primarily of forest roads within the UNAMCO concessions, not Region 10 Roads.

In response to the second question, I am advised that this has been the cause by the lack of adequate maintenance. The Company has not been doing regular maintenance.

In answer to question (iii); my answer is no, but forest roads and bridges are constructed with the code of practice for forest operations as outline by GFC. This takes into consideration the minimising of soil erosion and contamination of water ways.

In reponse to question (iv), the Company UNAMCO has been advised on the need to repair the bridges as the safety of their employees and other road users cannot be ignored.

And in answer to question (v), the Code of Practice for forestry operations stipulates the conditions under which forest roads and bridges must be built and maintained. The GFC is monitoring these more closely to ensure compliance.

The Speaker: Thank you.

Yes. Honourable Member.

Mr David Patterson: Mr Speaker, in the Minister's response to question (iv), I would just like to clarify -

Is it not the Government's responsibility to ensure the safety of all employees, persons of Guyana irrespective of the road is private or public and what does the Ministry intends to do about this?

The Speaker: The Honourable Minister

Hon Robert M Persaud: Mr Speaker, I am quite sure inherent in my response, it shows our concern and that is why we have advised the company and the need to repairs the bridges so as to ensure not only the safety of their employees, but all road users. It is inherent in my response.

The Speaker: Question No 5 is in the name of the Honourable member Mr Everall Franklin. Honourable Member You may proceed?

AND WHEREAS our African fore parents, first as slaves and then as free men and women built the infrastructure of modern Guyana and made unparalleled contributions in the development of Guyana;

BEITRESOLVED

That this National Assembly unequivocally acknowledges the immense debt that all Guyanese owe to our African ancestors and recognises the outstanding contribution they have made to the development of Guyana;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED

That an African Land Commission be established, similar in status to the Rights Commissions established under Article 212G of the Constitution of the Cooperative Republic of Guyana to determine the issue of ancestral land rights of African Guyanese;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED

That this National Assembly urges the British Government to enact measures to effect reparation to the descendants of the victims of the African Slave Trade and slavery.
