## QUESTIONS TO MTNTSTERS

Construction, Installation and Production at Guyana Glass Works Ltd., Boot and Shoe Factory, Bicycle Factory and Leather Craft Itd.

QUESTION: (i) Will the Prime Minister state whether all work pertaining to the construction and installation of the Guyane Glass Works Limited, has been completed?
(ii) If the answer is in the affimative, will the Prime Minister state -
(a) How long ago such work has been completed?
(b) What is preventing the glass factory from going into operation?
(c) What is the total cost for construction, equipment, etc?
(d) How much is the total foreign loan and what are the tems of such loans?
(iii) If the answer to Question (1) above is in the negative, will the Prime Minister state when he expects the construction work, installation of equipment, etc., to be completed?
(iv) Will the Prime Minister further state what the present position is as regards production at -
(a) the Boot and Shoe Factory?
(b) the Bicycle Factory?
(c) the Leather Tannery?

Cde. Reepu Daman Persaud: Cde. Speaker, I have been authorised by Cde.
Narbada Perssud to ask question No. 15 standing in his name on the Order Paper.
Cde, Thomas: Cde. Speaker, on behalf of the Cde. Prime Minister I wish to
respond by saying that all the construction works on the present phase of the Guyana Limited
Glass Works/factory facilities have been completed. These facilities were planned to manufacture two streams of products, namely, container glass and sheet glass. The container glass plant has been installed and was commissioned on the lith December, 1984. Secondly, it was decided for the time being not to activate the sheet glass until the prevailing depressed market conditions show a favourable change. However, at the moment, negotiations are being carried on with a friendly country with a view to activating the sheet glass plant when market conditions improve

(Cde. J. Thomas continues):
Thim the cost of construction and equipment is G\$50M which includes a loan from the Royal Bank of Canada (Montreal).

The terms of the loan are:
(1) repayment of principal in seven (7) equal semi-annual instalments
( $6 \times$ US\$857,143 and $1 \times$ US\$857,142).
The interest charges are:
(1) $2 \frac{1}{4} \%$ per annum
(2) the London Interbank Rate (LIBOR) rounded to the nearest $1 / 16 \%$.

In the event of default:
(1) $14 \frac{1}{2}$ per annum and LIBOR rate during the period oi default.

In anower to the third part, in view of the answers given to the first two parts an answer is not necessary for part four of the question.

I wish to state that up to June 1985, the tannery, Leather Craft Limited produced four thousand three hundred and fifty kilograms of leather with sales amounting to $\$ 174,000.000$.

The Bicycle Factory (Savannah Industries Limited) and the Boot and Shoe Factory are not currently in production. As a result of the tight foreign the flow of components and
exchange situation, raw materials for these enterprises has been too erstic to juctify their contimed operations for the time being. However, certain negotiations are being conducted at the moment with a view ro securing suitable arrangements under wich they might possibly be activated. Cde. Feepu Daman Perssud: Cde. Speaker, could the Cde. Hinister indicete roughly the time schedule - when it is hoped that these two bodies could be re-activated. This isvery vague - negotiatiori; are going on. I wonder if ve could get a indication how long from now?

Cde. Thomas: Gde. Speaker, I could not be sure. It depends on the speed with wich the negotiations proceed. Obviously we are hoping that these two agencies can get on stream as quickly as possible.
