You have been the joint Honorary Secretary of the Music Festival Committee since it was begun largely at your suggestion in 1952, and your tremendous hard work has been the inspiration behind the organization of successive Festivals.

His Excellency: Your service as a teacher has been most satisfactory, but it is in the field of music that your contribution to the country has been outstanding. Since 1952 you have been largely responsible for the Biennial Music Festivals in Georgetown. You are joint Honorary Secretary of the Music Festival Committee and the success of the Festivals is in a large measure due to your organization and supervision.

You have also made a name for yourself in arranging musical programmes in the Schools Broadcasts which have taught many children the joy of music and of singing together.
