AND WHEREAS on the 29th day of June, 1998, the Attorney General wrongly and unlawfully directed the Deputy Solicitor General to prepare a Notice of Appeal in relation to a matter arising out of a criminal case heard by a Magistrate in the Georgetown Judicial District;

AND WHEREAS the Attorney General improperly and unlawfully directed the Acting Director of Public Prosecutions to sign the said Notice of Appeal:

BE IT RESOLVED:

That this National Assembly rebuke the Attorney General for-

- (a) unlawfully interfering in a matter which he had no jurisdiction and to which he was not a party, and
- (b) giving unlawful directions to the Acting Director of Public Prosecutions.

Clause 10 was then passed as corrected.

Clause 11.

The following further correction was agreed to :-

Insertion of “thereof” after “termination” in the marginal note.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS REQUIRING WRITTEN REPLIES

No. 18 - ESTABLISHMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH UNITS

Question by Miss Jean M.G. Persico:

Would the Minister of Health and Labour say what plans his Ministry has to ensure that all agencies and institutions establish Occupational Safety and Health Units at the workplace, in the shortest possible time?

(Notice Paper No. 36 (Q19 Opp19) published 17.12.98)

Reply submitted by the Minister of Health and Labour:

1. Employers are not obliged to have safety and Health units in workplaces since it is not a legal requirement to do so. However, they will be required to have joint Safety and Health Committees established in workplaces which employ 20 persons or more and to appoint Safety and Health representatives in workplaces which employ less than twenty persons, when the OSH Act of 1997 is brought into force.
2. The Act will be brought into force as soon as the tripartite group which is addressing this matter arrives at a consensus in terms of the date.
3. To ensure that agencies/institutions comply with the legal requirements, the Ministry plans to do the following:
 - (a) Collaborate with CAGI and the TUC in conducting public awareness programmes to sensitise workers and employers re the OSH legislation.
 - (b) Write employers requesting compliance with the requirements within a given time frame.

Provide basic guidelines for the establishment of Committees and the appointment of representatives.

(d) Monitor workplaces to ensure compliance.

(e) When necessary, provide training for committee representatives. The Ministry is already equipped with audio visual equipment and packaged training programmes to meet these needs.

4. At present, approximately 100 Safety and Health Committees have already been established. They are located in workplaces in Regions 4, 3, 2, 5, 6 and 10. In addition, over the past 3 to 4 years, over 1,500 Committee representatives were exposed to OSH training and it is projected that in 1999 another 600 persons will be trained. Training activities were supported by the International Labour Organization (ILO) and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO). In 1996, through an ILO Project, 152 Committee Representatives from 42 workplaces received OSH Training. Funding for public awareness is expected from PAHO for 1999.
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No. 19 - AMBULANCE SERVICE

Question by Dr. Rupert Roopnaraine:

Will the Minister of Health and Labour say how many ambulances the Ministry provides, what is the condition of each ambulance, including its facilities for patient safety and survival and whether each is served by a driver trained for such service?

(Notice Paper No. 37(Q20 Opp20) published 17.12.98)

Reply submitted by the Minister of Health and Labour:

- (1) The Health Sector accounts for twelve (12) working ambulances excluding one in region 10 operated by St John's Ambulance Brigade in collaboration with the Ministry of Health & Labour.
 - (2) All of the ambulances are in good conditions and have basic equipment for patient safety and survival.
 - (3) Five of the drivers are trained ambulance drivers.
