## CHAPTER 101.

### MOSQUITO DESTRUCTION.

[No. XIX of 1910.]

[10th September, 1910.]

- Short title.** 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Mosquito Destruction Ordinance.
- Interpretation.** 2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—  
 “owner” includes the person for the time being entitled to receive the rent of the premises, or who would receive it if the lands or premises were let;  
 “local authority” means a local authority constituted under the Local Government Ordinance.
- Chapter 84.**
- Owner to keep receptacles for water in repair.** 3. The owner of premises shall keep in good repair all tanks, vats, barrels, or other vessels, used for storing water, and all gutters and water pipes, and shall keep them in such a condition as not to breed mosquitoes.
- Freedom from water breeding mosquitoes.** 4. The occupier of premises shall keep them free of all bottles, tins, boxes, shells, or other receptacles of a like nature, which may retain water and become breeding places of mosquitoes.
- Evidence of offence.** 5. The presence of mosquito larvæ in any collection of water on premises shall be evidence that the provisions of the last two preceding sections have not been obeyed, and the owner or occupier, as the case may be, of the premises shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty-four dollars.
- Penalty.**
- Entry on premises for inspection.** 6. Anyone authorised in writing by the Surgeon General may enter and inspect any premises at any time between eight in the morning and six in the evening, and any owner,

occupier, or other person in charge, of the premises who refuses the admission, or obstructs, or hinders, or prevents, anyone aforesaid from making the entry or inspection shall on conviction thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty-four dollars. Penalty.

7. Legal proceedings in respect of any breach of this Ordinance may be taken by any officer of the local authority of the district within which the premises are situate, or by anyone authorised in writing by the Surgeon General. Who may prosecute.
