UNDER SECTION 3 OF THE REPRESENTATION OF THE
PEOPLE (ADAPTATION AND MODIFICATION OF LAWS)
ACT, 1968, AND BY VIRTUE AND IN EXERCISE OF ALL
OTHER POWERS ENABLING HIM IN THAT BEHALF,
THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS HAVE BEEN MADE
BY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL:—

Citation.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Representation of the People (Adaptation and Modification of Laws) Regulations, 1968.

Prescription
of amend-
ments.

2. The following amendments to the Election Regulations, 1964, are hereby prescribed for the purposes of section 3 of the Representation of the People (Adaptation and Modification of Laws) Act, 1968, that is to say —

- (a) the substitution for the word "five" in sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph (3) of regulation 31 (which provides for entitlement to vote by proxy), in Part IV of the Regulations, of the word "three";
- (b) the substitution for the word "five" in paragraph (e) of regulation 100 (which penalises plural voting), in Part XI of the Regulations, of the word "three";
- (c) the insertion in Part XIV of the Regulations, immediately before regulation 113, of the following regulation —

"Elections
Commission
proceedings.

112A. (1) Except to the extent that jurisdiction in that behalf has been conferred, and the exercise thereof is required, by the provisions of the Constitution or any law made under article 71 thereof (which provides for the determination by the Supreme Court of Judicature of questions as to membership of the National Assembly and elections thereto) and save as hereinbefore provided to the contrary, no question whether any function of the Elections Com-

mission or of any of its members has been performed validly or at all shall be enquired into in any court.

(2) No evidence of any deliberations of the Elections Commission or communications between members of the Commission regarding its business shall be admissible in any court."
