**REGULATIONS**  
**MADE UNDER**  
**THE LABOUR ACT**  
(Chapter 98:01)

UNDER SECTION 28 (1) OF THE LABOUR ACT, I HEREBY MAKE THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Hours of Work (Watchmen) Regulations, 1975.

2. In these Regulations —

“watchmen” means any person wholly or mainly employed to watch over any specific property:

Provided that employment to watch over a private dwelling by the person residing therein, or only to operate or superintend the use of a gate, shall not be deemed to constitute employment to watch over property for the purposes of this definition.

3. (1) The number of hours which may normally be worked by a watchman employed on a daily or hourly basis, shall not exceed eight in any day.

(2) The number of hours which may normally be worked by a watchman employed otherwise than on a daily or hourly basis, shall not exceed forty-eight in any week.

4. A watchman employed otherwise than on a daily or hourly basis, shall be allowed by his employer a continuous period of twenty-four hours in every week during which he shall not be required by his employer to be on duty:

Provided that any such period shall not be disregarded in reckoning the number of hours worked by a watchman.

5. Any person who commits a breach of these Regulations shall on summary conviction be liable to a fine of one hundred dollars.

6. The Hours of Work (Watchmen) Regulations are hereby revoked.
