REGULATIONS

MADE UNDER

THE PLANT PROTECTION ORDINANCE, 1942.

(No. 3 of 1942).

UNDER SECTION 16 OF THE PLANT PROTECTION ORDINANCE, 1942, THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS HAVE BEEN MADE BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Plant Protection (Cotton Pests) Regulations, 1953.
2. Cotton lint, cotton linters, cotton seed meal or cotton seed cake shall not be imported except under permit issued by the Director of Agriculture who may, in his discretion determine the countries or places from which the same may be imported.
3. The Director of Agriculture may —
 - (a) impose such conditions with regard to the manner and means of shipment and to the taking of the necessary measures for fumigation of any such cotton lint, cotton linters, cotton seed meal or cotton seed cake before export from the exporting country or place, as he may think fit, on the grant of any permit under regulation 2 of these Regulations; and
 - (b) require, and define the terms of, a certificate of fumigation signed by an official of the plant inspection service of the exporting country or place, to be produced to the Comptroller of Customs before any such cotton lint, cotton linters, cotton seed meal or cotton seed cake is imported.
4. Nothing contained in these Regulations shall be deemed to prohibit the importation of manufactured cotton goods, prepared cotton wool or other processed cotton or of cotton lint or linters contained in factory-made mattresses or other manufactured articles.
