## REGULATIONS

## THE PLANT PROTECTION ORDINANCE.

(Chapter 245).

UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 16 OF THE PLANT PROTECTION ORDINANCE, THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS HAVE BEEN MADE BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Importation of Fruits and Vegetables (Temporary Provisions) Regulations, 1956.

2. In these Regulations—

“fruit” includes any edible part of or product derived from a flower, but does not include nuts, cereals, pulses, or dried, canned, candied or other preserved fruit.

3. Notwithstanding the provisions of regulation 4 of the Importation of Fruits and Vegetables Regulations, no fruit shall be imported into the Colony from Florida in the United States of America.

4. Notwithstanding the provisions of regulation 4 of the Importation of Fruits and Vegetables Regulations, and subject to regulation 3 of these Regulations, no fruit shall be imported into the Colony from the United States of America unless there are produced to the Comptroller of Customs.

- (a) a certificate signed by the Director of Agriculture showing that the fruit is not likely to cause infection inimical to the growth of plants; and
- (b) a certificate signed by a competent authority, recognised by the Director of Agriculture to be such in the country of origin of the fruit, showing that the fruit is free from pest or disease.
