AN ORDINANCE further to amend the Georgetown Town Council Ordinance

Enacted by the Legislature of British Guiana:—

A.D. 1956.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Georgetown Town Council (Amendment No. 3) Ordinance, 1956, and shall be construed and read as one with the Georgetown Town Council Ordinance, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance and any Ordinance amending the same.

2. Subsection (1) of section 22 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby deleted and the following substituted therefor —

“(1) The Council holding a Court may adjourn it to such time and as often as may be necessary, but so that no adjourned court may be held later than the 15th of June in any year.”

Insertion of
new section
25A in Chap-
ter 152.

3. The following section is hereby inserted after section 25 of the Principal Ordinance —

“Lists to be
printed and
copies de-
livered to
persons pay-
ing there-
for.”

25A. The Town Clerk shall cause the lists of voters when finally settled and signed as aforesaid to be printed, and shall deliver copies thereof to any person on payment of twenty-four cents for each copy of any such lists, and the proceeds of such sale shall be received by him on behalf of the Council.”

Repeal and
reenactment
of section
96 of Chap-

4. Section 96 of the Principal Ordinance, as amended by the Georgetown Town Council (Amendment) Ordinance, 1955, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor —

“Council
may award
pensions and
gratuities.”

96. The Council may award pensions, gratuities, or premiums (if any) to any of their officers or servants, or where any of their officers or servants dies while in the service of the Council, to the widow of the deceased officer or servant for the benefit of herself and of his children (if any) for their benefit, or to the mother of the deceased officer or servant, or to the persons selected by the Council in their uncontrolled discretion, for the benefit of the widow and children, or of the mother as the Council deems desirable; and in the event of the officer or servant leaving neither widow, nor child nor mother, then the Council shall pay the pension, gratuity or premium to his heirs, executors, or administrators. Such pensions, gratuities or premiums shall be paid out of the general revenue aforesaid:

Provided that any award of pension, gratuity or premium shall be in accordance with the conditions and rules and shall not exceed the rate of allowance, for the time being prescribed by law in the case of public officers.”

5. Section 4 of this Ordinance shall be deemed to have come into force on the 1st day of January, 1951.
